Winter Damage: Protecting Your Trees & Shrubs



Iowa's harsh winter climate can often be responsible for severe damage to landscape plants. Winter sun, wind, and cold temps can bleach evergreen foliage, damage bark, and injure or kill branches.

Winter food shortages often force rodents to feed on bark, twigs, foliage, etc. However, there are several ways to diminish and prevent these problems from occurring. You can wrap tree trunks with commercial tree wrap or burlap straps. We also recommend painting the trunks white with special paint to prevent splitting. This method reflects sunlight and can reduce temperature fluctuation that can lead to splitting. All wraps should be removed after one growing season to prevent insect or moisture damage.

Frost Heaving (which is caused by the freezing and thawing of soil) can also be a problem. A 4-6" thick layer of mulch will prevent heaving by helping to maintain a more constant soil temperature.

Snow and Ice buildup from storms can cause damage by bending and breaking branches. Proper pruning can help with this problem.

Although plant cold hardiness and winter injury are common with Iowa winters, appropriate plant selection along with cultural practices and preventative maintenance will significantly reduce or prevent severe injury or loss of landscape plants.

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
